This week you should have received a letter from me. I hope you will read it carefully and prayerfully. Last year at this time the stock market was falling almost every day, the financial markets were in disarray, and all of us were frightened.

Your estimates of giving for 2009 reflected your anxiety about the future, so our church's income has lagged four percentage points behind 2008 all year.

Our endowments take care of our buildings and grounds, but our offerings underwrite all missions and programs. We want to go into 2010 with confidence and optimism. The theme of my letter is, "There is Enough ... Enough for Us All."

## Self defense class is November 8

Nationally-known threat assessment specialist Robin Babb is coming to Boston Avenue to teach a self defense class for women and teenage girls. It will be held Sunday, November 1, 3:30-5:30, in room J221.

"This is an outstanding opportunity, especially for teenagers and young women," said Dr. Bill Crowell. "It's not often that we are able to engage someone of her stature and expertise."

"I'm well aware that women today often don't have time to learn the intricate and sometimes complicated moves of martial arts," says Babb. Consequently, she has developed a system of personal defense strategies for women that can be learned quickly and effectively with minimal training.

Babb is an entertaining, informative speaker. Along with radio and television addresses on self defense, she has helped to establish stalker legislation in California.

She will teach women to become more aware of surroundings and protect themselves in abusive relationships, workplace violence, or attacks on the street.

## Why I .....sing in the choir

*The Word* is starting a new series of faith stories entitled, "Why I...." The series, which will appear at least once a month, is the creation of communications chair Janet Purinton, who graciously agreed to write the following first article:

I sing; therefore, I am. With apologies to the French philosopher Descartes, I believe that what we do in the name of our Christian beliefs defines us. There are many reasons why I volunteer my time with the music ministry at BA, but I'd like to deal with four of them.

First, making music is mostly a team sport. Joining with people who come together to shed their daily identities and responsibilities and "make a joyful noise unto the Lord" is a powerful experience. The impact that one singer has can be magnified sixty or seventy times when that many voices blend in a powerful anthem for worship. The impact of the eight bells I play in Festival Ringers increases twelve fold when we play in a worship service as a group. We receive power and support from those around us on our team.

Making music is also an intimate way to worship. For those with musical inclinations, worship is highlighted in the sung response, the glorious introtit, the thunderous or contemplative anthem. No matter how I am feeling when I enter a worshipful situation, music centers me. The act of singing or playing bells is my conversation with a God that is very near to me. He gives me breath, but I am called upon to use it to his glory.

The capability to make music is a talent, but also a responsibility. I have a responsibility to join with like-minded people to lead worship and provide songs of comfort or encouragement. The hours that I spend with those like-minded people in rehearsal is part of my volunteer service at Boston Avenue. Most of us take that responsibility very seriously. We realize that music is only a tool, although an important one, in facilitating the time that we spend in a service of worship. What a wonderful and awesome responsibility!

Finally, I return to the idea that music is a major part of my
