From the Pastor's Study

Mouzon Biggs, Jr.

Three weeks ago I attended a seminar of twelve pastors of some of America's largest United Methodist churches. All had experienced a difficult financial year in their churches.

Last week Dr. Jim Jackson of Houston's prestigious Chapelwood United Methodist Church wrote to his people, "If you want your heart to be with God, put your money where you want your heart to be.

"Jesus said, 'Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.' (Matthew 6:21). In other words, your heart follows your money - not the other way around.

"Don't treat your giving as just another bill that has to be paid or as a religious tax or club dues. Make your gift a 'fruits first offering.' Set aside a percentage of your income and give that percentage off the top. Don't give God the leftovers.

"Put your money where you want your heart to be, and your heart will move there. If you want your heart to be with God, set a goal of giving ten percent of your income to God (a tithe). If you are unable to do that at this time, start with five percent and move up every year. Giving a percentage of your income is better than giving a set amount that has no relationship to your income. Trust me, you cannot out-give God.

"This way of giving will change your life because it will change the way you deal with your money. Each payday you will make a "thanks" offering to God that is in proportion to what God has just given you.

"Then, and only then, will you come to understand yourself as a steward of God's gifts rather than the owner of what you have."

My sermon next Sunday is *not* about giving, however. It will be called, "THE SYNAGOGUE WAS THE RIGHT PLACE TO BE!"

Financial Peace class begins Wednesday

Want to learn more about managing personal finances in a very enjoyable way? The opportunity has arrived!

Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University classes will be offered at B.A. starting this Wednesday, February 3 at 6 p.m. Financial Peace University (FPU) is a life-changing program that teaches participants to achieve their financial goals by eliminating debt, saving for the future, and giving to help worthwhile causes. More than 1 million families have attended FPU to be challenged and motivated to make a plan for their money and change their family stress levels.

Statics indicate that the number one reason for stress in marriages is the management of family finances. The class helps both individuals and couples

better understand the importance of avoiding debt, building wealth, finding bargains, saving for the future, and giving to help others.

Cost of the 13-week class is \$99.51 per couple and some 50% scholarships are available. The fee covers Dave Ramsey's book, a workbook, audio cd's of each class, and necessary supplies.

The class will be facilitated by members of the New Frontiers Sunday School Class who have taken it on their own and been helped. Class members meet each week to watch a video lesson and participate in discussion groups. Ramsey's presentation style is humorous and easy to understand

2010 Interfaith Trialogue: Youth and Religion

Youth and Religion in America is the topic of this year's free Interfaith Trialogue sponsored by the Oklahoma Conference for Community and Justice.

Boston Avenue will host the first of three sessions at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, February 7, and Dr. Bill Crowell will serve as moderator for all three sessions.

Session I will explore what history and the sciences tell us about teenagers. Our Oklahoma Conference Volunteer-In-Mission (VIM) office has received an urgent request for medical volunteers, especially for trained VIM team leaders and team members. UMCOR will need such volunteers fairly soon, and for the foreseeable future.

Anyone who would be willing to volunteer is asked to contact Paul Staat, 699-0133, call in their information to the OK VIM office at (405) 530-2029, or email them to okvim@okumc.org.

Needed information includes name; contact details (telephone and email, if possible); area of medical expertise; and VIM experience

UMCOR anticipates that teams will be asked to be in country for a week at a time.

Other volunteers will also be needed soon, and all interested volunteers in any field are asked to notify Paul of their willingness to serve in the future. At this stage, all nonmedical volunteers will be contacted only when it is clear who will be needed and when.

Health Kits

The Oklahoma VIM office is receiving health kits every day, with lots more promised. This is a heartening response! Please keep them coming! They can be delivered to the church, and they will then be taken to the conference office.

The first load of health kits will be transported to UMCOR's Sager Brown depot next week, then future kits will be delivered as they accumulate.

Together, our United Methodist Church is making a real difference for the people of Haiti.

Health kits for Haiti

Each kit should consist of a sealed one-gallon plastic (preferably freezer) bag filled with the following NEW items only. Kits may be brought to church to be sent on to UMCOR:

- * 1 hand towel (15" x 25" up to 17" x 27". No kitchen towels.)
- * 1 washcloth
- * 1 comb (large and sturdy, not pocket-sized)
- * 1 nail file or fingernail clippers (no emery boards, toenail clippers)
- * 1 bath-size bar of soap (3 oz. and up)
- * 1 toothbrush (single brush only in original wrapper, no child-size)
- * 6 adhesive plastic strip sterile bandages
- * 6 ounces or larger toothpaste with an expiration date at least a year from now
