Learn something new at the School of Continuing Education

Brochures for this year's School of Continuing Education are available at the church, and enrollment is now underway. Classes will meet October 6 through November 4, unless otherwise specified.

The brochures were not routinely mailed to church members this year, but they are available for all who want one. A full schedule and brief description of classes is also available on page 4A of this issue of *The Word*.

The registration fee, which includes as many classes as can be fit into the schedule, is just \$10 through September 30, or \$12 after that date. Some courses may require supplies and/or books at a minimal charge.

Forum Luncheons will be held each Wednesday during the school, and programs include Mayor Kathy Taylor; Larry Yadon, "Oklahoma Outlaws and Gangsters"; Dr. James Wilhite, "Afghanistan"; Dr. Brett Campbell, "Tulsa Achieves Program"; and Dr. Biggs. Cost is \$6 each.

Child care is available on Tuesday evenings for \$10 per child for the entire session. Reservations must be made by September 30.



From the Pastor's Study

Mouzon Biggs, Jr.

Dr. Robert E. Hayes, Sr., the father of our Bishop Robert E. Hayes, Jr., died Saturday.

When I had completed all of my academic work and been ordained, Bishop Paul Martin appointed me as associate minister of a large Houston church. Shortly thereafter, I started hearing wonderful things about Dr. Hayes. That was in 1965, when our country was struggling with the Civil Rights Movement and much it was still segregated. Dr. Hayes was a leader in the effort to join all Methodists into one church body. That union came in 1968 at the General Conference in Dallas.

Bishop Kenneth Copeland appointed Dr. Hayes to a special cabinet-level position to make that merger work in Texas. Dr. Hayes was a courageous peacemaker, again and again reassuring both blacks and whites that we could do this. By God's grace, we United Methodists could be one in Christ.

Later Dr. Hayes was sent to be President of Wiley College. With the coming of integration, Methodist colleges founded to educate a predominately African American student body were having a difficult time.

Under President Hayes's leadership, Wiley College thrived. Though you did not know him as I came to know and love him, you can see all of his strengths and talents in his son, our beloved Bishop Hayes. We send our prayers and condolences to him and to Dee in their grief.

B.A. member reaches century mark

B.A. member Alice Simon will celebrate her 100th birthday this Sunday, though she looks much younger. Mrs. Simon, who still lives in her own apartment overlooking the river at University Club Tower, enjoys visits with her daughters and their families, and going downstairs to tea with her neighbors.

Born in St. Louis, Missouri, she started modeling in high school. She later met and married Dan Simon, then the couple moved to Tulsa when he was transferred with Skelly Oil. She joined Boston Avenue in September, 1954.

"Dr. Galloway was so kind and friendly," she remembers. "My husband had a heart attach while he was on a business trip in Kansas City, and Dr. Galloway even checked on him up there."

After the death of her husband in the 1960's, Mrs. Simon spent 20 years in Stillwater as the house mother at the Sigma Nu fraternity at Oklahoma State University. She retired in 1986 and returned to Tulsa, where she again became active at the church. She especially remembers attending Dr. Biggs's classes in the School of Continuing Education.

"I just enjoy him so much," she says, "and everyone at church was so nice. I can't get up into the bus to ride to church any more, but I listen to the service every Sunday on television. Mouzon just has a great way of telling things."

Mrs. Simon has recently given up playing bridge and reading due to eyesight problems, but she thoroughly enjoys listening to music and says she's perfectly happy in her bright, sunny apartment.

When asked to share her secret for a long life, she smiles and says, "I'm just blessed."
